Apr 1 – Karen Collins, Manuel/Karen Rodriguez, Verde Halley and Mitchell Bush met for dinner at the Atlantis Restaurant in the Bradlee Shopping Center near the Church of St. Clement before the AIS monthly meeting.

Apr 4-5 – The Nottoway Indian Tribe of Virginia, Inc. hosted a spring gathering at the Chippokes Plantation State Park in Surry, Virginia. Nottoway member Sidney Turner served as the emcee and introduced members of the Tribal Council and special guests. A blessing of the food was followed by a literal feast. Afterward, there was much visiting, exhibits and social dancing. The drum group Ma Wachi from North Carolina sang. This is the drum group that sang at our pipe ceremony last fall. AIS members and friends in attendance included Karen Collins, Joanne Curnutt, Prissy Huguette, Mary Lecis, Allard/Lynette Allston, Buck Woodard, Debora/Mildred Moore, Roger/Paige Archer, Vincent Schilling (Indian Country Today), Sharon Johnson, and Mitchell Bush... Meanwhile, back at Indian Pines, Kathleen Dorn, Steve/Rie Miller and Rob Brown busied themselves chipping brush/small trees which Rob had taken down during his thinning of the trees growing in the vendor area. Michael Nephew, Verde Halley, Karen Collins and Mitchell Bush visited Indian Pines during the work party. That evening, Karen/Verde/Mitchell watched a showing of “Slumdog Millionaire.” On Sunday, Karen/Verde/Rob/Mitchell traveled to Indian Pines after breakfast at the Flying J. Kathleen Dorn was already at the property raking dead leaves. The group discussed work at the Pines and walked over to the Memorial Garden to check it out.

Apr 7-8 – Karen Collins, Rob Brown and Rob’s son, Robbie Ibay, traveled to Mitchell Bush’s home in Ruther Glen, spending the night there before heading to Virginia Beach early the next morning. Mitchell and Verde Halley joined the travelers to attend the unveiling of the historical highway marker to be set up by the Virginia Department of Historic Resources at the First Landing State Park to commemorate the Chesapeake Indian villages of Apasus/Chesepiooc and archeological discoveries of prehistoric Indian settlements in the Great Neck area of the park. Several persons who attended the reburial of the remains of Chesapeake Indians in 1997 were present. Speakers included Fred Hazelwood (Supervisor, First Landing State Park), Chief Barry Bass and Chief Emeritus Oliver Perry (Nansemond Tribe), and Kathleen S. Kirkpatrick (Director, Department of Historic Resources). Deanna Beacham moderated the program. AIS members/friends in attendance included Karen, Rob, Robbie, Verde, Mitchell, Michael Butler, Sylvia Nary-Strickland, and Vince Schilling (Indian Country Today). After the ceremony at the Trail Center building, AIS folks walked over to the reburial site and placed tobacco ties in the young dogwood trees circling the reburial site. The tobacco ties were provided by Karen. On the ride back to Ruther Glen, Karen, Rob, Robbie, Verde and Mitchell took a side trip to Jamestown to ride the ferry across the James River to the town of Surry where they had lunch at the Surry Restaurant before continuing their trip. Once back, the group dispersed to their respective homes.

Apr 11 – The Intertribal Women’s Circle held a hand drum making session at the home of Mildred Moore on the Pamunkey Reservation. Each participant worked on a drum until finished. The session took place in Mildred’s back yard until the weather changed and the group moved to Mildred’s carport. Participating in the session were Mildred/Debora Moore, Karen Collins, Joanne Curnutt, Prissy Huguette, Michael/Kiros Auld and Rose Powhatan, Barbara Drifmeyer/Tyler and Dylan Nohilly, Karen Rodriguez, and Chief Lynette Allston. Karen Collins, Rob Brown and Robbie Ibay stayed overnight at Mitchell’s home.

Apr 12 – On a beautiful, sunny, spring day, the AIS folks gathered at Indian Pines for an Easter Picnic. In attendance were Michael Nephew, Karen/Manuel Rodriguez, Karen Collins, Chuck/Judy/Billy Gray, Verde Halley, Mitchell Bush, Riccaree/Cynthia/Tiombe/Tahj Vaughan, Glen/Myra Dunwoody, Rob Brown and Robbie Ibay. While the older folks watched, the younger set played kickball in the arena. After a meal consisting of chili over noodles, spinach with pineapple and raisins, Mitchell’s macaroni salad, fry bread and a variety of cold drinks, Riccaree/Cynthia hid a couple of dozen eggs for Tiombe, Tahj and Robbie to find. Mouse hosted the Dunwoody’s two Shih Tzu members of their family.

Apr 17 – The recognition committee of the Virginia Council on Indians (VCI) held a meeting in the General Assembly Building in Richmond, VA to finalize its recommendation on the Nottoway Indian Tribe's recognition petition. Attending were the Chairman Earl Bass, and members Helen Rountree, Arlene Milner and Mitchell Bush. Guests included Lynette/Allard Allston, Paige Archer, Jack Milnor, William Wright, Archie Elliott, Sid Turner, Edwin Dukes, Alfred Whittaker, Leroy Hardy and Eric Gregory (AG's office). The Nottoway petition received "No" votes from Earl Bass, Helen Rountree and Arlene Milner, and a "Yes" vote from Mitchell Bush. Committee member Anne Richardson was not present. The vote on the petition will be reported to the VCI.

Apr 17-19 – Gary Four-Star and other members of the Assiniboine Thunder Bird Clan hosted an Animal Spirit Dance at the farm of Long-Walk II coordinators Curt and Shelia Hanson in Delaplane, VA. It was a three-day social/spiritual gathering and healing ceremony open to all nations, beginning with a pot-luck dinner and social on Friday evening as campers and guests began to arrive. The ceremonial fire was lit just after sunset and attended all night by various guests drumming all night, in addition to a few Buddhists monks from the Peace Pagoda in New York who dropped in to offer their support. Saturday's events began with a sunrise ceremony drum followed by a talking circle and sweat lodges throughout the day. The dance was held within an arbor at sunset, and lasted until almost midnight. Conversations and talking circles lasted into the early morning hours. Sunday began with another sunrise ceremony and talking circle. Originally scheduled to end mid-morning, the Sunday gathering didn't end until afternoon when the talking circle ended and guests began to make their way back to their homes. Local natives spotted in the crowd included Mitchell Bush/Rob Brown/Karen Collins who were invited to bring the AIS booth, Kathleen Dorn, Michael Nephew, Rie/Steve Miller, Ed Lozier/Dot Leighan, Ray Brock, Randy Lewis, Emily Gross, Elizabeth Peterson, Carol Lavallo-Bauer/Ted Bauer, Barbara Drifmeyer, Karen/Manuel Rodriguez. Ellery Pennock who coordinated the herbal offerings, Marie Taylor who donated Saturday's breakfast foods, and Evans Craig who helped host the event via the DC Natives yahoo group. *Submitted by Kathleen Dorn.*

Apr 18 – Mitchell Bush and Rob Brown took the AIS information/craft booth to the Native gathering in Delaplane. The weather was sunny but a bit windy. In addition to the ceremonies and sweat lodges, many of the guests enjoyed walking around the property. Mitchell/Rob left rather early to return to Ruther Glen.

Apr 19 – A birthday party for Brandy Berger and Manny Martinez was held at Mitchell Bush's home in Ruther Glen, VA. In addition to the guests of honor and host, Verde Halley and Mogli greeted arriving guests Herb Bush, Tori Cheeseman, Debbie/Jimmy Presley, Tammy Hinson, Trevor Ottinger, Lorraine Lomstead, Mike/Denise/Adrienne/Jill/William Henessy, Karen Collins, Chuck/Judy/Billy Gray, Rob Brown, Mike/Cindy Binette, and Manuel/Karen Rodriguez. Herb/Trevor grilled the chicken, ribs and hamburgers while Debbie brought her famous potato salad and Mitchell made his macaroni salad. Verde brought the birthday cake and ice cream. After dinner, "Happy Birthday" was sung to the special guests and cards/gifts opened. Most of the day was spent relaxing outside and most of the folks came in to eat. Manuel/Billy built a roaring fire in the backyard. That evening, Karen Collins and Rob Brown stayed over to attend a function the next day.

Apr 20 – The Governor's Volunteer Service Awards Presentation and Reception were held at the Maryland Hall for Creative Arts located in Annapolis, Maryland. AIS member Jay Winter Nightwolf was nominated to receive recognition by Frederick Nordham, who we know as an Indian Veteran who provides color guard services to the overall community. Jay, along with several others, received Individual Awards. Other categories were Youth Under Age 26, Youth Group, Public Safety & Emergency Response, Group, Business Group, Faith Based, Senior and Special Recognition. Opening entertainment was provided by the Pan Masters Street Orchestra. The program was emceed by Wanda Draper of WBAL-TV 11; the color guard was provided by the Maryland National Guard; the National Anthem was sung by Anna Nicholson; and a Welcome by Linnell Bowen, Executive Director of the MD Hall for the Creative Arts and Israel Patoka, Executive Director of the Governor's Office of Community Initiatives. Presentation of Awards and remarks were made by Secretary Jeanne Hitchcock. AIS members/Jay's friends in attendance included Becky Tudisco, Alexis Hankinson, Riccaree/Tahj Vaughan, Dena Picken, Suji Sutler, Verona Iriarte, Natalie Proctor, Alex Firewalker, Karen Collins, Rob Brown and Mitchell Bush.

Apr 21 – The Virginia Council on Indians (VCI) held a meeting at the General Assembly Building in Richmond, VA. VCI members present included Earl Bass (Acting Chair), Sharon Bryant, Reggie Stewart, Deanna Beacham (VCI staff) and Mitchell Bush. Guests included Sidney Turner, Lynette/Allard Allston, Archie Elliott, Carolyn/Crystal Joiner, Bill/Nathaniel Elliott, Marion Whitlow, Michael Steen, Beth Roach, Nathan/Tracy Elliott, Walt Brown, Cynthia Brown, Toni Manning, Beverly El, Deanie/Kimberly Freeman, Rikki Two Trees, Edwin Dukes, Gloria Hawkins, Juanita Smith, Inez Burton, Bert Dore, William Lamb Howers, Melissa Canaday, Helen Rountree, Roger/Paige Archer, Buck Woodard, Anne Adam, Eric Gregory (AG office), Karen Collins, Rob Brown and Vince Schilling (Indian Country Today). The invocation was given by Jerry Stewart. Due to the lack of a quorum, the approval of last month's minutes will be delayed until the next meeting. Deanna reviewed the VCI budget. Under Public Comment, Walt Brown spoke about the Chereonhaka Nottoway; Helen Rountree presented documentation regarding the eight already recognized tribes; Paige Archer presented documentation regarding the recognition committee's vote on the Nottoway petition; and Lynette Allston expressed her viewpoint on the Nottoway petition. Under Old Business, Michael Steen of the 1781 Foundation repeated his request for a letter of support. There is some urgency because of a May 1 grant application deadline. VCI will write a letter of support. Reggie Stewart gave a report on the VCI conference. Earl Bass gave the final report of the recognition committee on the Nottoway petition. He also read a message from Chief Ken Adams who was reacting to an Indian Country Today article about the Nottoway Tribe's assertion that they received unfair treatment in their bid for state recognition. Chief Adams stated that Mitchell Bush and Paige Archer claimed that Helen Rountree was biased in her consideration of the Nottoway petition. Mitchell informed the chair that he had not claimed bias. Mitchell's comments were extracted from a rough draft report to the recognition committee asked for by the committee chairman, and did not allege bias, but acknowledged that Dr. Rountree had criticized his earlier comments on the procedure's deficiency and questioned Dr. Rountree's association with one of the other groups of Nottoway Indians and statement that there was no Nottoway Tribe (before any decision was made.) Under Announcements, the next VCI meeting will be held on May 19, 6:30 p.m., Room 7 West of the General Assembly Building... A highway marker honoring the Monacan Town of Mowhemcho will be dedicated on April 26, 3:00 p.m... VITAL Powwow May 2-3 at the Chickahominy Tribal Grounds... 17th Annual Monacan Powwow at Elon, VA... Vince Schilling announced that photos of the VCI Conference were available at his website.

Apr 22 – A Property Management Committee meeting was held at the home of Kathleen Dorn at her home in Burke, Virginia. The discussion included several projects to upgrade Indian Pines as well as which projects should take precedence. At the top of the list was installing a deeper well to provide enhanced water flow, and regrading and reseeding the powwow arena. Rob Brown, a professional landscaper who was present at the meeting was consulted for advice on several land improvement projects at the property including the arena, and halting erosion along the banks of Reservation Ln. Last winter Kathleen talked to our Indian Pines neighbor, Mr. Wood to get a ball park estimate of the costs, and will contact him again to obtain the names of the contractors he used and obtained estimates from. The group also discussed the pavilion and the feasibility of replacing the two trailers with more permanent and secure structures. Steve Miller, Kathleen and Karen Collins are researching several options including used office trailers, log cabins and "double wides" versus new construction. This is part of an ongoing research project started two years ago. Pete Neconie, Karen/Manuel Rodriguez, Ricaree/Tiombe Vaughan and Samuel Wakefield. No guests were present.

The minutes of the April 1, 2009 meeting were read by Karen Mallicoat-Rodriguez and approved as read. Faye Lone gave the treasurer’s report of AIS accounts including a status update on inaugural ball finances, outstanding issues and ongoing efforts.

Old Business: Kathleen reported on status of inaugural ball ticket, finance and wrap-up reports and documents still needed. Kathleen will meet with Faye on Saturday. VEVITA will have a float again this year. The Black Creek Gourd Society will be at the Navy Memorial, 8th and Penn, on the 23rd and had asked if a potluck lunch could be provided. Need to research location and logistics.
